# Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

## Statement of intent



At Appletree Gardens First School, we pride ourselves on our inclusive strategies to ensure all pupils have the best start in school. Our curriculum intent is designed with this in mind. No matter the background, we want all pupils to develop and carry the **'grow your learning'** mindset in all aspects of school life and beyond. We have five golden threads that run through our curriculum to support this ambition:

- I am healthy.**
- I am happy and safe.**
- I have opportunities.**
- I have a voice.**
- I reach my potential.**

This is our aim for all pupils, irrespective of their starting point or disadvantage. Pupil premium funding enables us to address the barriers that our disadvantaged pupils face to ensure that they are able to fully 'grow their learning' and establish bright futures at Appletree and beyond.

Our pupil premium funding supports pupils to:

### Reach their potential

- Maximise the % of pupils from disadvantaged backgrounds who achieve the: Good Level of Development at the end of EYFS.
- Maximise the % of pupils from disadvantaged backgrounds who achieve the: Phonics Screening check.
- Maximise the % of pupils from disadvantaged backgrounds who achieve the end of KS1 expectations in Reading, Writing and Maths.
- Maximise the % of pupils from disadvantaged backgrounds who achieve Year 4 Multiplication check.
- Develop a love of learning and build a toolkit of how to 'grow their own learning' that develops with them at Appletree and beyond.
- Develop consistent challenges, checkpoints and support for all pupil premium pupils.
- Ensure aspirations for all disadvantaged pupils are high across school.
- Deliver high quality SEND support for pupils and their families.
- Run evidence-based interventions and out of school additional provision.

### Access opportunities

- Ensure our families recognise the value of good attendance and punctuality as a key step to accessing and maximising school opportunities.
- Ensure all staff are well trained and equipped to manage and support potential barriers to learning in all year groups for pupil premium pupils.

- Deliver additional in class support to give pupils entitlement to the full curriculum and support our 'gloriously ordinary' agenda.
- Provide quality enrichment activities, visits and visitors.
- Engage and equip parents with the necessary information and resources to raise the profile of learning at home.
- Continued focus on our inclusive offer regarding different start points, backgrounds and culture (Equalities Action Plan)
- Ensure all pupils are aspirational about their future and equip them with the skills to be successful. (Skills Builder)

**Be happy, healthy and safe.**

- Provide robust pastoral care for pupils and their families in all year groups including Supernanny, Mental Health Connect Team and Thrive.
- Develop a strong moral code (BLOSSOM code) together with independent strategies for successful behaviour management and positive mental health.
- Prioritise pupil safety through safeguarding training and monitoring, Early Help, Attendance strategies and family activities.
- Focus on healthy school opportunities, training and development; PE Mark, healthy school award, CPD, visits and visitors.

**Have a voice.**

- Prioritise speaking and listening through the curriculum including; Skills Builder, Talk for Reading, Talk for Writing, Reading for pleasure (book talk)
- Forest School, early Speech and Language interventions.
- Develop stakeholders' views through robust monitoring. E.g. Poverty proofing audit (external provider), governor challenge.
- Develop regular pupil voice through curriculum monitoring, pupil roles (school council, BLOSSOM buddies, Eco-warriors, BLOSSOM house challenge including House Captains\ Vice Captains)

## Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	
1	Supporting the gap between disadvantaged pupils and their non-disadvantaged peers in phonics, reading, writing and maths.
2	Writing is our lowest achieving subject across school. The gap between pupil premium children and their non pupil premium peers is largest in writing.

3	Supporting reading routines, engagement and reading for pleasure throughout the school community.
4	Supporting all pupils and their families to have high expectations and aspirations for their future and equip them with the skills to achieve them.
5	Ensuring families access all home learning opportunities and work in partnership with the school.
6	Supporting families with wider issues: cost of living, mental health support, Team around the Family support.
7	Pupil premium children have lower starting points than their non- pupil premium peers in Reception.
8	Nursery and Reception receive a significant number of pupils 'new' to Appletree in September\ entry points. We also have a steady intake of pupils joining us in KS1 and KS2 throughout the year.
9	The percentage of SEND pupils who are also pupil premium are 35%. One third of our EHCP pupils are pupil premium.
10	Supporting pupils\ families with social and emotional issues which affect school life for pupils.
11	Ensuring parents understand the benefits for pupils of regular attendance and punctuality.
12	Pupils enter school with differing level of experiences e.g. travel\ visits, culture, resources (e.g. access to clubs\ group experiences, instruments) To expand pupil opportunities and experiences to support wider interests, health and curriculum development. To develop a targeted approach to ensuring all pupils receive equal opportunities and skills development.
