

Grow your Maths in Year One

We want our children to be confident mathematicians who are able to apply their skills to solve problems, learning from mistakes and showing resilience.

Number and Place Value

- Count forwards and backwards from any given number to 100 and beyond.
- Read and write numbers to 100 in numerals. Count in multiples of 2s, 5s and 10s.
- When shown a number, say what is one more and one less.
- Write numbers 1 to 20 in words.
- Identify and represent numbers using objects and pictures including on a number line, and use the language of: equal to, more than, less than (fewer), most and least.

















Grow your Maths in Year One

Number - Addition and Subtraction

- Use the maths symbols +, and = in a number sentence.
- Know number bond facts and related subtraction facts within 20 such as 1 + 5 = 6 and 5
 = 6 1.
- Add and subtract one and two-digit numbers to 20, including zero.
- Solve one-step problems that involve addition and subtraction, using concrete objects and pictures, and missing number problems such as 7 = -9.

Number - Multiplication and Division

 Solve one-step problems involving multiplication and division, by calculating the answer using concrete objects, pictures and arrays with the support of an adult.







Grow you Maths in Year One

Number - Fractions

- Know that a half is one of two equal parts, and find half of a shape or a set of objects by sharing the shape or set into two equal parts.
- Find a quarter of a shape or a set of objects by sharing the shape or set into four equal parts.

Geometry - Properties of Shapes

- Recognise and name some common 2-D shapes such as rectangles, squares, circles and triangles.
- Recognise and name some common 3-D shapes such as cuboids and cubes, pyramids and spheres.

Geometry - Position and Direction

 Describe position, direction and movement, including whole turns, half turns, quarter turns and three-quarter turns.







Grow your Maths in Year One

Measurement

 Use words such as long/short, longer/shorter, tall/short and double/half to describe maths work when measuring.

 When weighing, use the words heavy/light, heavier than, lighter than to explain work.

- When working with capacity, use the words full/empty, more than, less than, half, half full and quarter to explain work.
- Answer questions about time, such as Who is quicker? or What is earlier?
- Measure and begin to record the following: lengths and heights; mass/weight; capacity and volume; and time in hours, minutes and seconds.
- Recognise and know the value of different denominations of coins and notes.
- Tell the days of the week and months of the year and talk about weeks and months and years and what they mean.
- Tell the time and draw hands on a clock for to the hour and half past the hour times.







Grow your Writing in Year One

Children are provided with many opportunities to develop and apply their writing skills across the curriculum. It is our ambition that they are able to speak, read and write fluently so that they can communicate their ideas and emotions effectively.








Talk For Writing

Talk for Writing is powerful because it enables children to imitate the language they need for a particular topic orally before reading and analysing it and then writing their own version. It build on three stages of teaching:

- 1) Imitation the children learn a text and the language they need
- 2) Innovation the children adapt the model text with ideas of their own
- 3) Invention the children create their own text using the language and skills that the model taught them.








Grow your Reading in Year One

Blend sounds in unfamiliar words using the GPC's (Grapheme Phoneme Correspondence) that they have been taught



Grow your Speaking and Listening in Year One

The quality and variety of language that pupils hear and speak are vital for developing their vocabulary and grammar and their understanding for reading and writing. Our ambition is to ensure the continual development of pupils' confidence and competence in spoken language and listening skills.

- Talk clearly and loudly enough to be understood by others
- Listen attentively to others and respond appropriately
- Take turns when speaking without interrupting others
- Ask relevant questions to extend their understanding and knowledge
- Use spoken language to develop understanding through speculating, hypothesising, imagining and exploring ideas
- Participate in discussions, presentations, performances, role play,improvisations and debates


Writing

- Recognition of number whilst out and about door numbers/signs/ etc
- Coins for pocket money 2p, 5p, 10p to help with times tables
- Access to a clock face to help tell the time
- Practise number bonds to 10 and 20




